New and returning grant writers

Many students have never written a grant proposal until they arrive at graduate school. We offer courses on writing SSHRC, CIHR, and NSERC proposals in August and May, which combine lectures, tutorials, and opportunities for students to get feedback on their draft proposals. Multilingual students

We offer three courses on academic writing for L2 speakers (students who learned English later in life) as well as a course on Academic Conversation Skills (ACS). We offer these courses in multiple sections throughout the year. The ACS course is also offered in an intensive format in mid-August for newly arriving multilingual students.

Students learning to become more confident/productive writers

No matter how many languages a student speaks, academic writing at the graduate level is challenging for many. Through courses on Prewriting Strategies for Developing and Organizing Your Ideas and on Becoming a Becter Editor of Your Own Work, we help students develop conscious strategies for clarifying their thinking and writing at all stages of the writing process. Students who seek individual support with particular writing challenges can book appointments at the Writing Centre.

Nervous public speakers

Our synchronous and asynchronous <u>Oral Presentation Skills</u> courses give students a chance to hone their presentation skills, to rehearse in front of an audience, and to get feedback.

Dissertation/Research-article writers

In addition to our five-week courses on Writing Research Articles and on Thesis Writing in different divisions, we offer <u>Dissertation Boot Camps</u> (3 days) and a <u>Research-Article Boot Camps</u> (2 days) for students who want to immerse themselves in their writing process for a few days to build confidence, find community, and explore strategies for establishing productive daily writing routines.
